

new wiring, new valves and perhaps the most important item, the six cylinder motor was unstuck! It now purrs like a kitten and can't be heard with the hood closed...based on my hearing.

Willis also buffed and polished the blue paint to a point where it's as good as it will

get; ditto for the bright work. He brought it back to a high luster. Only a little 'pitting' on the cast metal parts.

On Tuesday, August 26, 'The Two Musketeers' Sir Daniel of Materazzi, Sir Thomas of Kenney and their

coachman, yours truly, visited Sir Willis at his castle and observed first hand the amazing transformation of the DeSoto.

All jesting aside folks, what Willis Terret has done with this car is beyond amazing and he did it with what must be considered a very reasonable amount of funds. Certainly,

not because he's cheap but because it's so easy to go off the deep end. The value added to the car well exceeds expenditures.

After an hour long examination of the car, we were treated to a ride in the DeSoto, now with 'Historic' Maryland registration. Willis demonstrated the semi-automatic 'tip-toe' shift transmission. The 65-year-

old sedan rode and drove beautifully, exhibiting plenty of power and excellent road worthiness. The car is now a 'driver', most of the mechanical work is completed. As mentioned, the exterior is now very shiny. The interior, including the seats, door panels, floor-

ing, headliner and dashboard are excellent. The left and right front door pulls will be recovered.

I for one could not wait for Willis to share this gem with the public. On Saturday, August 30th, I was planning on attending the

weekly cruise-in at Marley Station Mall in Glen Burnie. This is a really fun event and most Saturdays you can expect to see 400 to 500 cars and always something different. After Willis parked the car, there were people surrounding the car and quizzing Willis and Murry the remainder of the evening. To top things off, it made it even more special because this particular evening, President Gary Wilmer and Gary Ruby attended the Marley Station cruise in, both long time friends of Willis.

Being involved with the saga of the 1949 DeSoto from the beginning as a forlorn hulk to this wondrous transformation is so satisfying. It's a testament to what the capabilities of Chesapeake Region members can achieve. Of course, not all members have the time, place, skill and wherewithal to take on a project of this magnitude and bring it to fruition in only six months.

One of the requirements Chesapeake Region of A.A.C.A must follow, is publication of changes to the Club's By-Laws. Changes and revisions to the by-laws must be printed in *Two Consecutive Months* of the Club's bulletin for distribution to members. Below are changes raising annual dues from \$15 to \$20.

CHESAPEAKE REGION, ANTIQUE AUTOMOBILE CLUB OF AMERICA (As Revised and Adopted May 2014)

Article VII:Dues

- Sec. 1 The dues shall be \$20 per year for Individual and Joint Membership, \$12 per year for Student Membership, \$10 per year for Junior Membership, and \$300 in one payment for Life Membership. Membership status is governed by Article VII.
- **Sec. 2** Membership renewal notices shall be included with the November issue of *The Chesapeake Bulletin*.
- Sec. 3 The annual dues shall be payable concurrent with AACA dues. A member whose dues have not been paid by the AACA dues cutoff date, or who has not maintained his membership in AACA, shall automatically be suspended.
