

For many antique car buffs, nothing is more rewarding than the process of acquiring or restoring a vehicle, and then showing it at car shows as a member of the Chesapeake Region AACA or one of the various automobile clubs.

Generally, these venues call for a step by step process leading to qualifying for the top awards, followed by recognition each subsequent time the car is shown. After participating numerous times, it can become less exciting, although attending these shows to enjoy all the cars and the association with other car enthusiasts is still a wonderful time.

Opportunity!

It's been my experience that there are opportunities to exhibit our vehicles at another type of car show, namely, the various 'Concours d'Elegance' events. We're all aware of some of the big name Concours d'Elegance events, like Pebble Beach, California; Amelia Island, Florida; Hilton Head, South Carolina. However, there are many more events held all over the country. In fact, The annual 'Elegance' at Hershey is Antique Automobile Club of America's entry into this type of event and grows larger and more prominent every season.

There are more of these all the time as organizations and communities recognize the opportunity for fund raising and generating revenue. The good news is that almost all of these shows also accept a variety of quality cars, motorcycles, boats, and even tractors that may or may not be particularly rare or expensive. *Invitation only...*


nance), list prior awards, and enter other relevant information. Certain eras, vehicle types, and styles will be featured at a given show, so these vehicles are more likely to be invited.

Concours events are held in beautiful surroundings, and the cost of general admission is usually very high, but is free for exhibitors in the shows in which I've participated. At most of these shows, we were treated to free gourmet lunches, were provided with signs for the car display, and were given nice 'goodie' bags.

Judging is usually done by well qualified and

than, AACA judging, it is not based on achieving a points threshold to qualify for an award. In most cases there are first place awards as well as one or two second place awards in each of many categories. Each event has its own class breakdown, and that can be seen by looking up previous classes and winners on the event web site sometime after the event.

Each time I've gone, the award ceremonies were held on the same day as the Concours. A tent and platform is set up for the winners to drive up individually to receive their awards. It's quite a show, and there's usually a huge crowd watching intently as the cars parade through. The awards at the shows I've attended are nice engraved cut glass, with ribbons for the selected vehicles.

After accompanying CRAACA member Frank Salemi with his Alfa Romeo to Radnor Hunt Concours d'Elegance in 2008 and Hilton Head Island Concours d'Elegance in 2010, at his urging I showed my 1934 Ford at the Hilton Head Island Concours d'Elegance in 2011, the Radnor Hunt Concours d'Elegance in 2013, and the Saratoga Springs, New York, Hemmings Concours d'Elegance in 2013. Bud Currey and I then showed my '35 Ford pickup at the Radnor Hunt Concours d'Elegance in 2015. Conveniently one of the classes last year was for classic pickups. I was pleasantly surprised to have been awarded a first in class in each of the Radnor Hunt and Hemmings events, and a Palmetto Award at Hilton Head, proving that you don't need an exotic or classic high-end car to compete at these events.




Happy Valentine's Day Ladies!
